



PORT OF SALEM, MASSACHUSETTS

Salem, Massachusetts has been one of New England's richest destinations for 400 years. Most noted for the Salem Witch Trials of 1692, exploring Salem takes a visitor from the 17th-century to the 21st-century through literature, architecture, maritime heritage, military history, and fascinating stories of remarkable men and women from Salem who have made contributions to Salem, New England, and the world. Visit soon to see how Salem is *still making history*.

LOCATION & ACCESS

Salem is 16 miles north of Boston, and 14 miles north of Logan International Airport. Salem is a 30 minute drive from Gloucester, Ipswich, and Essex., and 24 miles from historic Lexington, Massachusetts.



The high-speed seasonal Salem Ferry provides service from Boston's Long Wharf and Salem Wharf late May through October.

Commuter Train service between Salem and Boston's North Station takes 30 minutes and is available daily, year-round. The train continues to Ipswich, Rockport, and Newburyport.

The Salem Trolley is available for hire to transport passengers around Salem, and several motor coach operators and receptive tour operators are available. **Please visit Salem.org or call (978) 741-3252 for more information.**

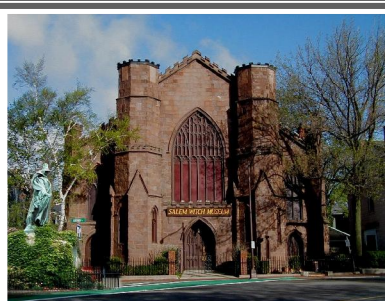

SALEM ITINERARIES

Salem Witch Trials of 1692

The Salem Witch Trials are ingrained in the American story as a dark period of fear and accusation. Several tours and attractions interpret the events of 1692, allowing ample opportunities for visitors to learn lessons of tolerance from the stories of the Salem Witch Trials. We believe every visitor should reflect on the events of 1692 at the recently restored Witch Trials Memorial.

Maritime Heritage

Salem has a vibrant, exciting maritime heritage that you can experience through visiting the tall ship *Friendship*, sailing aboard the replica Schooner *Fame*, and exploring museums established by sea captains and filled with treasures from around the globe. See the vast international collections of the Peabody Essex Museum and then explore the personal treasures in the Phillips House Museum on Chestnut Street.

Culinary Salem

Indulge in a Salem Food Tour, which connects Salem's maritime and spice trade heritage with the modern restaurant scene, or explore independently. Don't miss Salem Spice on Pickering Wharf, and make sure to stop along the North of Boston Seafood Trail at Finz Seafood, Capt's Premium Steak & Seafood, Victoria Station, and the Lobster Shanty, which was featured on *Diners, Dives and Drive-ins*. New restaurants in 2014 include Turner's Seafood at Lyceum Hall and A&B Burgers in the Old Salem Jail, adding historical location and great menus to the mix!

Salem Sampler

If this is your first visit to Salem, we recommend an overview tour aboard the Salem Trolley, immersion in the Witch Trials story at the Salem Witch Museum, Witch Dungeon, or Wax Museum, and a tour of the iconic House of the Seven Gables. If time allows, the Peabody Essex Museum offers a unique step into Salem's historic and contemporary global connections. The tour, three attractions, and lunch will fill a day with just enough time to shop for the perfect souvenir!

Literary Salem

Novelist Nathaniel Hawthorne is one of Salem's most famous sons, and here you can immerse yourself in his stories when you walk down Turner and Derby Streets. Playwright Arthur Miller found inspiration in Salem, as do contemporary novelists including Brunonia Barry, Kathleen Kent, and Katherine Howe. Don't miss the House of the Seven Gables, which inspired both Hawthorne and Barry.

Arts, Comedy, Theatre

Check the calendar on salem.org for upcoming theatrical performances at Salem Theatre Company, improv comedy at the Griffen Theatre, and live music nightly in our restaurants. Salem's year-round festival schedule promises something new almost every weekend, from poetry to jazz, dance to art en plein air.
